Community Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment

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Introduction


Community parks and recreation needs assessments are intended to identify levels of satisfaction with existing services a Park District provides, as well as identify the unfulfilled community needs that could be met with the addition of new services or the enhancement of old services. These studies typically use data gathering methods of community meetings, visioning sessions and community surveys.

In social science, the tendency is for community surveys to be responded to by older citizens of the community, using traditional survey data gathering methods. The Public Research Group enhances mail and telephone surveys with email questionnaires that tend to reach younger residents and households with children.

Public Research Group (PRG) uses random sample selections of email, mail and telephone candidates so that samples are valid representations of the entire community. In this study, random samples of telephone, mail and email candidates were selected independently of each other, so that no one household would be able to respond to more than one of the survey types.

In this Hoffman Estates Park District study, surveys were sent out to a sample of mail, telephone and email addresses, receiving 848 total responses, of which 360 were email surveys, 296 were from returned mail surveys and 192 were completed telephone surveys. The sample of 848 total responses provides a 95% level of confidence with a +/- 3.5% confidence interval for the population of the community.

Sample by Percent



The survey instrument, provided in the Appendix of this report, was comprised of 18 questions with 152 possible data points. Data points are individual answers to questions that can be analyzed. One hundred fifty two data points represents a substantial body of data for analysis, with many comparisons available for reporting. The Appendix includes much of the data generated through the planning process and is a valuable resource to go along with the analysis of the findings.

Some questions considered different subjects at the same time. For instance, Question 4A asked respondents if they or anyone in their household utilized the Bridges of Poplar Creek Golf Course. Respondents were provided a yes or no response opportunity, which would be considered one data point. If respondents said they did utilize the course, they were asked to rate the condition of the facility, using a Likert Scale response. The Likert Scale choice would be considered a second data point for the question as well as a different subject. The use of Likert Scales is very common in surveys and typically has five potential choices (strongly agree, agree, neutral, disagree & strongly disagree). A numerical value is assigned to each potential choice and a mean figure for all the responses is computed.

The overall intent of this study is to provide residents of the community with the opportunity to identify the park and recreation services they used, the condition of those services, and to identify how they would like to see those services improved. In the survey, closed-ended questions were asked, with respondents selecting from choices provided. The study did allow for open ended questions from the focus groups, interviews, visioning sessions and in the survey itself which gave each respondent an opportunity to express answers in their own words.

In this report, closed-ended responses are analyzed statistically, using statistical tables, charts and graphs. The statistical techniques used are primarily frequency distributions and one-sample means testing. A frequency distribution is a summary of how often different scores occur within a sample of scores. It is commonly used to categorize information so that it can be interpreted quickly in a visual way, usually in the form of tables. One-sample means testing allows researchers to determine whether the mean of a sample data set is different than a known value.

For the open-ended responses, analysis will be performed qualitatively, with tables showing unedited responses. Qualitative analysis involved searching for themes within open-ended responses and discussion of the frequency with which these themes occurred.

In social science research, both quantitative and qualitative assessments are considered important methodologies in measuring public sentiment. It is typically held that statistical analysis provides breadth in identifying community needs and qualitative analysis provides depth.



Demographics of the Study

Demographic information gathered in this study included the general location of where respondents resided (Question 16), length of time they had lived in the community (Question 15), their gender, age and the gender and age of those living in the household. Not every respondent was willing to provide his or her gender, or those of the members of their households, which is typical in social science research (Question 17), but the majority of respondents did.

Demographic information is not only interesting, but it can be important in determining the needs of the community. For instance, it may be interesting to learn that households in certain sections of the community may see the need for improved services in their area more than respondents in other sections of Hoffman Estates, but it is also important to know if an agency goal is to deliver equitable levels of services in different locations.

It also may be interesting to learn that female and male respondents see the need for new services differently or may even use services differently, as may senior citizens and non-seniors. It may be important to know this in designing new program offerings.

Another important reason to gather demographic data is to compare it to Census data to see how close the sample is to the general population of the community. This report begins with such a comparison.

In the case of gender, according to Census estimates from 2010, approximately 50.4% of Hoffman Estates residents were females.

Gender of Respondents



In this study, where 79.7% of those responding provided their gender, 54.5% of those responding were female and 45.5% male. This finding suggests that, while female respondents were slightly higher respondents than Census data showed, the difference was within the margin of error, suggesting that the data sample is a valid representation of the total population.

Another demographic consideration is the age of respondents. Considering the age of respondents in this study, Census estimates from 2010 suggested the average age of the population of residents of Hoffman Estates was approximately 35 years of age.

The survey data showed that the average age of respondents was 53.83 years. This might seem high compared to Census data, but considering that those under 18 years of age were not permitted to respond to the survey, and none did, for comparison sake, 18 needs to be added to 35. If this is done, the comparative age of the community based on the Census would be 53 years of age, very comparable to the 53.83 in the study.

It was mentioned in the introduction that different data gathering methods were expected to reach different average ages of respondents. Such was the case in this study, with mail, telephone and email samples.


Average Age of Respondents




The data from this study shows that the average age of email respondents was 47.02 years compared to 56.73 for mail and 58.47 for telephone. The findings support the hypothesis that email respondents were younger than mail or telephone respondents, suggesting that the addition of a substantial email sample to the total random sample had the effect of creating a more valid study sample of the community.

Another measure of the validity of the findings is the percentage of households that reported having children in them. The data shows that, of the 848 respondents to the questionnaire, 690 answered Question 17, with 421 having no children in the household and 269 with children. Eliminating the non-respondents to the question suggests that 39% of respondents to the survey reported having children in the household which is very close to the 2010 Census estimates. This comparison again shows the validity of the data from the combined samples of mail, telephone and email respondents.









Comparing the percentages of respondents by data gathering methodology shows that 54% of email respondents reported children in the household compared to 26% of mail and 21% of telephone. The findings suggest that, without the 360 email responses to the survey, the study would have been underweighted toward childless households.

Another demographic comparison is the location of residency of respondents within the Hoffman Estates Park District. There are two ways of analyzing those findings. One is the code on the bottom of the questionnaire itself, shown in the following scatter plot superimposed on a map of the park district boundaries.



A second way of comparing respondents is from Question 16, where respondents were asked if they lived west of Route 59/south of I-90, east of Barrington Road/south of I-90 or North of I-90. This question was not responded to by everyone, with the following totals.

Area of Residency




The data shows that 125 respondents declined to identify where they lived, but of those that did, 28.9% said they lived north of I-90, 52.9% said they lived east of Barrington Road/south of I-90 and 13.2% said they lived west of Route 59/south of I-90. These totals are fairly representative of the distribution of population within the park district.

The final demographic consideration was the longevity of residence within the community. Typically, older respondents tend to live in a community longer than younger respondents. The average length of residence of those responding to Question 15 showed that the average length of residency was reported in the following table.

The average number of years of residency within the Hoffman Estates Park District was about 20.5 years. There were differences in length of residency, depending upon the methodology of data gathering.

Length of Residency



Email respondents reported living in the Park District 14.14 years, compared to 22.69 years for mail respondents and 25.93 years for telephone respondents. This correlates with the findings of lower average age of email respondents and that a higher percentage of email respondents had children in their households.

Overall, demographic findings suggest the sample of Hoffman Estates households is comparable to Census estimates, providing the Hoffman Estates Park District with a high degree of confidence that the findings of this study are reflective of community sentiments. Just what those sentiments are is the subject of the remainder of this report.



Park and Facility Usage

The first question asked respondents how often someone in their households visited Hoffman Estates parks during the past 12 months. Respondents were allowed to say they used them daily, weekly, monthly, yearly, or never.

The graph shows that, of the 848 respondents, only 19 didn't answer the question. Of the 97.8% who did, 9.2% of them said they visit parks daily, 33.5% said weekly, 27.9% monthly, 12.3% yearly, and 17% said they never did. The findings suggest that 83% of those surveyed are users of the parks at least annually. A high percentage of them are frequent users.

Question 1A asked respondents how their households would rate the overall physical condition of the Hoffman Estates parks they have visited. Respondents were provided the choices of saying the overall physical condition was excellent, good, fair or poor.

Condition of Park District Parks

The responses to the question show that, of those who answered Question 1A (i.e. those respondents who visited parks), 28% said they were in excellent physical condition, 62% said good condition, and a combined 9.9% said they were in fair or poor condition.


Analysis of these findings would suggest that the vast majority of respondents felt that the parks were in excellent or good condition, suggesting the perception of the community about the park system is positive.

Question 2 asked respondents how often their household participated in programs or utilized facilities of the Hoffman Estates Park District during the past 12 months. Respondents were permitted the choices of saying they did so daily, weekly, monthly, yearly or never.

Benchmark Comparison of Frequency of Visiting Programs & Facilities





The survey responses show that, of those 95% of respondents who answered Question 2, 5.7% said they participated in programs or utilized facilities at the Hoffman Estates Park District on a daily basis, compared to 25.6% on a weekly basis and 21.8% on a monthly basis. These three groups would be considered frequent users, totaling 53.1% of those responding. Infrequent users would be the 46% who participate or utilize on an annual basis or never at all. The Park District has a high frequency of use at least once a month at 54% as compared to other park and recreation agencies.


Utilization of specific facilities was asked in Question 4, where respondents were first asked if they used eight different Hoffman Estates Park District facilities and, if they did, their ratings of those facilities.

The first two parts of Question 4 dealt with utilization of the Bridges of Poplar Creek Golf Course and its food and beverage service. The following graph shows that 13.9% of those responding to the combined mail, telephone and email surveys said they utilized the golf course and 10.1% said they utilized the food and beverage service.

Bridges of Poplar Creek




Parts E and F of Question 4 asked whether respondents utilized the Triphahn Community Center or Triphahn Ice Arena.



The data shows that 31.4% of respondents said they made use of the community center portion of the Triphahn Center during the last 12 months and that 12.8% made use of the Ice Arena.

The percentages of those respondents who utilized the Prairie Stone Sports and Wellness Center, Seascape Family Aquatic Center, Vogelei Barn, and Willow Recreation Center are shown in the following graph.


The findings show that Vogelei Barn is the least utilized facility. However, it should be noted that with 11% of respondents saying they made use of it at least once during the past year, it is still a highly used facility.

Comparatively, the Triphahn Community Center is the most utilized facility within the Hoffman Estates Park District, with the Seascape Family Aquatic Center second at 28.8% of the public utilizing it, the Prairie Stone Sports and Wellness Center third with 27.3% of those responding saying they utilized it, and the Willow Recreation Center fourth, with utilization by the public at 23.1%.

Park and Recreation Participation

Question 5, like Question 4, had two parts. The first was whether respondent households had the need for any on the list of 25 different program categories. Need could be interpreted to mean that respondents already make use of such an activity, but could also be interpreted to mean that respondents would like to participate but did not at this time. The following graph compares the percentages from each category.

Need for Program Areas





The graph shows the most popular recreational activities are adult fitness and wellness programs, with 55.3% of all responding households saying that someone within their household participated. Participation in community special events was the second highest, with 45.0% saying someone in the household had participated.

In the second tier of participation, senior active adult programs had a 25.1% participation rate, adult water fitness programs and public ice skating had 24.2% participation rates, trips to special attractions and events had a 23.9% participation rate, youth sports programs had a 21.9% participation rate, and nature programs and exhibits had a 21.8% participation rate.

Public Research Group has assessed the programs offered by the Hoffman Estates Park District and hypothesizes that most of the needs for these services are met by Park District programs. To test that hypothesis, Question 9 asked respondents if anyone in their household goes outside of the Hoffman Estates Park District for recreational services.

Reasons for Going Elsewhere



The graph shows the percentages of respondents who said they went elsewhere for services and provides the reasons they did. The highest percentage of respondents, 18.1%, were those who said they went elsewhere because the Hoffman Estates Park District did not offer the services they wanted, many of which were not services that park districts tend to offer anyway. Convenience and price were factors, but only 12.3% said it was because other agencies do a better job of providing them.

In the Appendix of this report, the open-ended responses to Question 9 show other reasons people said they went elsewhere for recreation services. Most of the reasons were provided as closed ended responses in the questions. Some of the reasons were simply statements of where they went.

More illuminating are the responses to Question 9A, which asked respondents what recreation services they received when they went outside the Hoffman Estates Park District for services. The tables of their responses are in the Appendix, with categories for adult recreational services, those for youth, and services for preschoolers.


The services which respondents' said they went out of town included adult fitness classes, use of the Schaumburg aquatic facilities, dance classes, and trips. In nearly every case, the same services are offered by the Hoffman Estates Park District, suggesting that respondent's reasons for going elsewhere for recreation services are distributed across those provided in Question 9.

The youth and pre-school recreation programs in Question 9A that respondents said they went elsewhere to receive are, for the most part, services which the Park District operates as well. There was not as many programs for pre-schoolers as there were for the youth category. Many of the youth responses were for travelling sports teams, suggesting overall that the Hoffman Estates Park District is serving its residents well enough that few have a good reason to go elsewhere.

Facility and Program Satisfaction Levels

Questions 3-5 asked respondents to rate their satisfaction levels regarding facilities and programs. Question 3 asked respondents to rate overall household satisfaction with six different recreation service categories; ease of registration, fees charged for facilities, fees charged for programs, quality of programs, quality of special events, and variety of programs offered.


Most respondents provided answers for these categories with less than 20% of them declining to rate programs, consistent with the responses to Question 2 where about the same percentage said they never participated in Park District programs or use Park District facilities. Also, readers should be aware that rounding errors might show some totals not equaling 100%.




The responses to their satisfaction level with ease of registration showed that 59.3% of respondents to the mail, telephone and email survey felt very satisfied, and 34.9% were somewhat satisfied, for a combined satisfaction level of 94.2%.




The total satisfaction level for the category of respondents' satisfaction with fees charged for facilities was 87.3%, with 35% very satisfied and 52.3% somewhat satisfied.






Satisfaction with fees charged for programs was consistent with satisfaction with fees charged for facilities, with a combined total of 88.4% of respondents either very satisfied or somewhat satisfied.

Quality of Programs




Quality of program satisfaction was very high, with 93.7% of respondents either very satisfied or somewhat satisfied. Only 6.4% were either somewhat dissatisfied or very dissatisfied.

Quality of Special Events



Just as satisfaction with fees for programs and fees for facilities were consistent, satisfaction with the quality of programs and quality of special events is consistent. A total of 94.2% of mail, telephone and email survey respondents were very satisfied or somewhat satisfied with the quality of special events. Only 5.8% of respondents said they were somewhat or very dissatisfied.

Satisfaction with the variety of programs offered was also high, with 87.5% of respondents to the question saying they were either very or somewhat satisfied. A total of 12.5% of respondents said they were very or somewhat dissatisfied.



The findings from Question 3 suggest that overall satisfaction levels with Hoffman Estates Park District recreation and facility service levels are good. However, as the graphs portray, the somewhat satisfied category represents a high portion of the responses which suggests that the Park District can improve in these areas. Therefore the goal is to move more of those that responded into the very satisfied rankings. The findings are similar to the responses found in Question 4, where respondents were asked for their ratings of the conditions of eight different facilities; the Bridges of Poplar Creek Golf Course, the food and beverage service there, the Prairie Stone Sports and Wellness Center, the Seascape Family Aquatic Center, the Triphahn Community Center, the Triphahn Ice Arena, the Vogelei Barn, and the Willow Recreation Center.

Respondents were permitted the choices of saying that the conditions were excellent, good, fair and poor. Only those who said they used each facility was asked to rate the facilities' condition. The following table shows the totals.

The data presented in the table shows that the highest rated facility in terms of condition was the Prairie Stone Sports and Wellness Center, with 63.9% of respondents rating it excellent and 33.3% rating it good. The Willow Recreation Center had a combined rating of 70.7% that found the facility in excellent or good condition, while 29.3% found it in fair or poor condition. The lowest was the Vogelei Barn, with 64.3% rating it as excellent or good.

The Bridges of Poplar Creek Golf Course was rated high, with 59.7% of those utilizing the facility rating it excellent and 34.3% rating it good. The food and beverage service at Poplar Creek did not receive as high of ratings. There were no comments at the end of the survey to illuminate the reasons why.

Question 5 asked respondents to rate their satisfaction with the 25 current program areas offered at the Hoffman Estates Park District. The question did not specify whether respondents actually participated in the programs or not, but the assumption is that they did. If they didn't, they would have little knowledge of the programs.

Respondents were permitted the choices of saying they were very satisfied, somewhat satisfied, somewhat or very dissatisfied, or that they didn't know. For the sake of this study, those who didn't know were such a small percentage of the total respondents that they were eliminated from consideration.

Another important consideration in the presentation of the findings in the following table is that, in spite of the overall sample being large, with 848 total cases, the samples of program satisfaction are relatively small for some program areas. Rounding error is also a consideration in small sample data.



The table shows the highest levels of program satisfaction are the pre-school/early childhood programs, where 66.7% of respondents were very satisfied and 19.0% were somewhat satisfied, for a total of 85.7% level of satisfaction.

The findings also suggest the lowest levels of satisfaction were from gymnastics and tumbling, where 35.3% of respondents were either somewhat or very dissatisfied and 35.3% were very satisfied.

It should be noted that these are program areas, not specific programs. Specific programs or instructors were not necessarily provided high or low ratings. There could be a number of factors which contributed to satisfaction. The findings do suggest that the data provides a metric from which the Hoffman Estates Park District can begin to look at services where it feels improvements need to be made.

Question 14 asked respondents their household's level of satisfaction with the overall value they receive from the Hoffman Estates Park District. Respondents were provided the choices of saying they were very satisfied, somewhat satisfied, somewhat dissatisfied, very dissatisfied or that they didn't know. Of the total 848 email, mail and telephone surveys, 158 said they didn't know. Of the remaining 690 that responded, the following chart shows their responses.



The chart shows that the combined respondents were overwhelmingly satisfied at 92.7%, with 41.4% very satisfied and 51.3% somewhat satisfied. Of the total 7.3% of those dissatisfied, 4.7% were somewhat dissatisfied and 2.6% were very dissatisfied.

The findings suggest the public is generally satisfied with the overall value they receive from the Hoffman Estates Park District. The numbers are solid, but work can be done to decrease the somewhat satisfied percentage and move them into the very satisfied category.



Communication

Question 6 asked respondents how satisfied they were with the communications provided by the Hoffman Estates Park District. Four criteria were considered, including the availability of information about programs and facilities, customer assistance by staff at facilities, customer assistance by staff for programs and events, and overall communication with residents. Respondents were permitted to say they were very satisfied, somewhat satisfied, somewhat dissatisfied, or very dissatisfied. Those who didn't know were eliminated from the analysis.

The table shows that the data is fairly consistent, in that most respondents assigned the same level of satisfaction to each of the four questions, and that most were very satisfied with the levels of communication provided by the Hoffman Estates Park District.

Question 7 was a satisfaction question specific to the website. Respondents were asked to rate their household's satisfaction with the website regarding general information, online program registration, park and facility information, programs and current events, user friendliness, and financial information transparency.

Because a large number of people in the community do not yet make use of the website, the sample of responses was smaller than the total sample, but not a small sample by any means. About 490 people of the 848 in the sample answered each of the questions. As would be expected, a higher percentage of email respondents answered the question than mail or telephone respondents.


The table shows that overall satisfaction with the Hoffman Estates Park District website is high and fairly consistent when comparing each of the criteria. The highest levels of satisfaction were that the Park District website provided general information about the Park District. The lowest was that the website was not user friendly.

Question 8 asked respondents to rank the methods in which their households learn more about the Hoffman Estates Park District. Respondents were provided a list of media outlets and were asked to assign a rank of

2 to the outlets they used most often, a 1 to those that they sometimes used, and 0 if they never used the outlet.

The following charts compare the percentages of respondents who said they never learned about the Hoffman Estates Park District through that media outlet, to those who sometimes did and those who did so most often. The intention of this graphic is to identify the most effective media for communicating with the public.

Cable TV



The chart shows that 95.9% of those responding said they never learned about the Park District from cable TV, 3.0% did so sometimes, and 1.1% did so most often. The following chart shows how a much higher percentage of respondents said they learned about the Park District through direct mail.

Direct Mail




The comparative responses of email and mail and telephone respondents were similar. This was not the case regarding how respondents rated cable TV. The previous chart shows that a higher percentage of respondents said they learned about the Hoffman Estates Park District from direct mail rather than cable TV.

For instance, 1.1% of respondents from the combined email, mail and telephone surveys said they learned about the Park District from direct mail most often and 3.0% sometimes, compared to 29.5% of respondents to the direct mail question who said they learned about the park district most often and 20.7% who said sometimes.

Considering the responses to the cable TV question, when comparing email responses with those from mail and telephone, it is clear that email respondents pay more attention to cable TV than do mail and telephone respondents.







The previous graph shows that email respondents learned about the Hoffman Estates Park District far more often than did mail and telephone respondents. Sixty-five percent of mail and telephone respondents never learned about the Park District from cable TV compared to 20.7% of email respondents. Conversely, 52.2% of email respondents learned about the Park District from cable TV compared to 17.7% of mail and telephone respondents.


Since previous analysis found that email respondents were younger and more inclined to have children in the household, cable TV may be an effective medium for communicating with the younger demographic.

As the next chart shows, overall, email blasts are less effective than direct mail but more effective than cable TV.




The chart shows that 18.9% of combined email, mail and telephone respondents heard about the Hoffman Estates Park District most often from email blasts, compared to 15.9% who heard about it sometimes, and 65.2% who never heard about the Park District through email blasts.





The graph shows that similar differences between email respondents and mail and telephone respondents were apparent when comparing their responses to learning about the Park District from email blasts. The intuitive hypothesis that email respondents learned more about the Park District from email blasts is supported in the data. The graph shows that 70% of email respondents learned about the park district often or sometimes, compared to 16.5% of mail and telephone respondents.


While this study was not designed to compare email, telephone and mail responses to every question, the comparison shows the value of email data to make the entire database a valid representation of Hoffman Estates constituents. The following chart presents the entire database findings for the question of whether respondents learned about the Hoffman Estates Park District from Facebook. As it shows, Facebook is not a particularly effective means of communication.



The chart shows that 95.2% of those responding to the combined database said they never learn about the Park District from Facebook, compared to 4% who said they did often and 5.2% who said they did sometimes.


The percentage of the email respondents who said they learned about the Park District from Facebook was somewhat higher. Of email respondents, 8.1% said they learn about the Park District most often from Facebook and 9.5% said they did sometimes.

The differences between email, mail and telephone respondents is significant. Facebook can be a tool to communicate with the public, however, traditional means are still more important.



The combined data for marquee signs shows that 42.9% of respondents said they most often or sometimes learn about the Hoffman Estates Park District from the signs. The differences between email respondents and mail respondents was that 63.9% of the email respondents learned about the Park District most often or sometimes, compared to 30.7% of mail and telephone respondents.


Newsletter



A slightly higher percentage of respondents said they learned about the Park District from the newsletters. Breaking this combined sample into the two subsets of respondents, 72.7% of email respondents said they learned about the Park District from newsletters compared to 34.6% of mail and telephone respondents. The pattern of email respondents paying more attention to media outlets continues.







Regarding newspaper articles, surprisingly only 6.3% of the combined survey data respondents said they learn about the Hoffman Estates Park Districts most often from newspaper articles.


Likewise, 19.3% of respondents said they learn about the Park District sometimes from newspapers, and 74.4% said they never do. Email responses were very similar to mail and telephone data in this case.


Learning about the Hoffman Estates Park District through its website showed that a higher percentage of respondents from the combined data used the website. The combined respondents said that 25.7% of them learned about the Park District most often from the website and 26.5% did so sometimes. A total of 47.8% of them never used the website.

Park District Website



The data was understandably different for email, mail and telephone respondents.






When comparing the email responses to mail and telephone responses, as would be expected, email respondents said they learned about the Park District in much higher percentages from the website. In the case of the most often responses, 4.31% of email respondents said they did compared to 16.5% of mail and telephone respondents. Of those who said they never learned about the Hoffman Estates Park District from the website, 62.3% of mail and telephone respondents said they never did compared to 20.3% of email respondents.


Learning about the Park District from the program guide showed that email, mail and telephone respondents provided very similar responses. The combined findings are in the following chart.

Program Guide




The program guide showed the highest percentage of respondents who learned about the Park District most often and sometimes, with only 21.3% of the combined respondents saying they never did.

The combined data regarding learning about the Hoffman Estates Park District from schools in the community was fairly consistent between email, mail and telephone respondents. The combined data showed that 2.3% of all respondents learned about the Park District most often from schools, and 8% did so sometimes.




Signs and flyers was somewhat a different case. The combined data chart shows the overall percentages.




The data shows that only 5.2% of the combined respondents learned about the Park District most often from signs and flyers, 22.4% did so sometimes, and 72.3% never did.

Comparing the email data to the mail and telephone data in the following graph shows there were differences between the two data sets.



The differences are statistically significant but not particularly meaningful. Of those who said that they learned about the Park District through signs and flyers, 8.7% of email respondents said they did often compared to 3.5% of mail and telephone respondents. Comparatively, 54.3% of email respondents said they never did with 81.0% of mail and telephone respondents saying never.






The percentages of combined survey respondents that learned about the Hoffman Estates Park District through Twitter was lower than those learning about the Park District from Facebook. For Twitter, only .4% of those responding said they did so most often, compared to 4.0% for Facebook. For Twitter, .4% said they did so sometimes, compared to 5.2% for Facebook. The differences between email, mail and telephone responses for Twitter were neither statistically significant nor meaningful.

The response percentages for YouTube were even lower.

YouTube



Only 1 respondent among the 848 total said they learned about the Hoffman Estates Park District most often from YouTube, which calculates to .1%. Six respondents of the 848 said they did so sometimes, calculating to .8%.

Word of mouth is typically a frequently used means of communication. However, for the Hoffman Estates Park District, 6% said they learned about the Park District most often from word of mouth and 30.8% said they did so sometimes. 63.2% said they never learn about the Park District by word of mouth.



The data did not show significant or meaningful differences between email, telephone and mail data.

Interpretation of the responses to Question suggests that some media of communication are more effective than others, as the table shows. Electronic media, such as cable TV, Facebook, Twitter, and YouTube have not yet come of age as a means of communication. This is true, even among email respondents, as previous data showed.

Among the media, somewhat effective are signs and flyers, and newspaper articles. Email blasts are more effective, as are marquee signs and newsletters. The Hoffman Estates Park District website is pretty effective, but the brochure is a very effective means of communication.

What is important is, even though some means of communication have not yet come of age, so to speak, the Hoffman Estates Park District is using all of the tools at its command to communicate with the public. As years pass, the more effective media may change.

Actions Being Considered

Question 10 asked respondents to evaluate a list of actions the Hoffman Estates Park District is considering and provide their opinions about whether these actions would be very important, somewhat important, that they were not sure, or were unimportant.

The actions were: expanding existing daily activity space for seniors/active adults at the Triphahn Center Senior Center, developing a dog park east of Barrington Road and south of I-90, developing a splash pad/water feature within a park north of I-90, converting some existing baseball/softball and soccer fields to artificial turf, and providing a new indoor multi-purpose facility (baseball, softball, soccer, etc.).

The table shows that converting the existing baseball/softball and soccer fields to artificial turf is not highly popular, with 5.2% of all respondents saying it was a very important action to consider and 12.2% saying it was a somewhat important action to consider.

Developing a dog park east of Barrington Road and south of I-90 was more popular, with 11.9% saying it was very important and 15.7% stating it was somewhat important.

The most popular actions were expanding the existing daily activity space for seniors and active adults in the Triphahn Center, developing a splashpad within a park north of I-90, and providing a new indoor multipurpose facility with baseball, softball and indoor soccer.

With a plurality of respondents stating that they thought considering those actions were very important or somewhat important compared to considering those actions not important, the findings suggest they have a basic level of support from the respondents.

Question 11 asked respondents which of the actions from the list in Question 10 were the most important. Respondents were asked to indicate their first, second and third choices.

The table shows the respondents thought the most important actions that the Hoffman Estates Park District needs to consider is to expand daily activity for seniors and active adults at the Triphahn Center Senior Center. A total of 83.3% of respondents (46.7 + 19.6 + 17.0) selected that list of action to be their first, second or third choice. The second and third most important issues were the development of a splash pad/water feature within a park north of I-90 (69.4%) and the provision of a new indoor multipurpose facility (67.2%).

Question 13 asked respondents to indicate how much their household agrees or disagrees with five statements. The statements were that respondents think it is important for the Hoffman Estates Park District to continue to plant native plants and wildflowers along pond shorelines to promote shore stabilization, to expand and enhance Park District community special events, to promote parks and programs to combat obesity and other health issues, to pursue partnerships and sponsorships with private entities to provide alternate revenues to offset operating expenses, and to pursue partnerships with other public governmental entities to expand services offered.

Respondents were provided the choices of saying they strongly agreed, somewhat agreed, somewhat disagreed, or strongly disagree. Those who were not sure did not answer the questions and were not included in the analysis of this question.

The Public Research Group found that the email, mail and telephone respondents answered the question with similarity. The following table shows the percentage of respondents who agreed or disagreed with the statements, combining the email, mail and telephone response data.

The table shows respondents strongly agree that continuance of planting native plants and wildflowers, at a rate of 52.4%. For the same statement, 34.8% agreed somewhat.

A total of 52.0% strongly agreed that partnerships should be pursued with private entities to provide alternate revenues to offset operational expenses, and 39.1% agreed somewhat.

Also popular was the initiative to pursue partnerships with other governmental units to expand services as well as to promote programs to combat obesity and other health issues.


The least popular was to expand and enhance Park District community special events in that most respondents somewhat agreed with that initiative rather than strongly agreed. The respondents disagreeing with any of the initiatives were relatively low.



Park Amenities

Question 12 asked respondents what amenities would be important to their household in Hoffman Estates Park District parks. A list of amenities was provided and respondents were permitted to check as many as they wanted. The table is a presentation of the percentage of respondents that selected each amenity. The percentage of respondents who selected each amenity is a percentage of the total data base of 848 respondents.

The table shows the most popular park amenity is walking/biking paths, with 67% of all respondents marking that amenity on their surveys. Restrooms were the second highest amenity at 56.4% and litter receptacles third at 51.7%.

Other popular choices were playground equipment, with 49.5% of those surveyed selecting that amenity, natural areas at 46.3%, drinking fountains at 44.7%, and general open space at 42.5%.

Respondents were permitted their own open-ended choices, which are presented as a table in the Appendix of this study. Hockey rinks, an indoor pool, park benches, and fishing areas were among the choices, as well as choices that were provided in the question itself. None of these open-ended responses occurred multiple times.

Public Research Group has performed community needs assessment studies for many Park Districts in Chicago and northern Illinois. It finds the drinking fountain, pet waste bins, restroom, and litter receptacle responses typically high in all these communities. In the case of the Hoffman Estates Park District, the high percentage of responses for more open space and natural areas is a meaningful finding.

Final Comments

The final comments in the study represent open-ended statements from survey respondents about whatever subject is on their minds. The email comments are unedited because they are entered directly by the respondents themselves. The mail and telephone comments are summarized for the sake of time and space.

Public Research Group believes that these comments should be reviewed by the agency and considered carefully and that the comments of one person is not a representation of public opinion.

In many ways, they represent a large public meeting where people are permitted to express themselves anonymously. Therefore, themes in the comments should be assembled to see if there are important issues that need to be considered.

The table of final comments is in the Appendix of this study.



Forward Planning Committee Visioning Workshop

A meeting was held early on in the planning process with the Forward Planning Committee of the Hoffman Estates Park District in order to gain a better understanding of a variety of different topics. Reviewing the responses led to a number of different conclusions. The website is a useful tool mainly for younger people and as a way to rapidly send out information, and it will become more important into the future. The Committee also feels that the geography of Hoffman Estates creates many issues financially, as well as being a barrier to a more united community. The tax rate and fees are fair compared to competitors, but more research should be done. The Committee also provided different amenities that they would like to see included in outdoor parks, including restrooms, shelters with BBQ's, emergency call boxes, litter and recycling bins, playgrounds, trails, and more sports courts.

When asked about changing the Park District, the Committee would like to see commissioners have access to newer technology such as Ipad's, and an increased importance on athletics with an indoor multi-sport facility as well as eliminating grass fields and replacing them with artificial turf. There were also two main themes that came out of the discussion of what is missing from the Park District. First is the lack of a downtown, and thus there is no central destination park for the entire District to form around. The second is the lack of people in the parks, and changing how the Park District approaches a changing demographic in the community.

The following table are the responses given by the Forward Planning Committee to a variety of questions provided at the meeting.

Focus Group Meeting

Two meetings were held on September 26, 2013 with invited members of the local community to better understand what the public thought of the Hoffman Estates Park District. The meetings used eight different discussion questions, with general comments being recorded, as well as a handout of 8 additional questions about the Park District. Both focus groups felt that one of the major strengths of the Park District was the programming. They commented on the wide variety of programs and the quality of instructors and staff. The groups also felt that the parks and facilities are well maintained and that they have many of the amenities that the community needs.

The weaknesses provided by the groups identified a number of different programming issues within the Park District. One issue that was brought up on numerous occasions was swim lessons being full and confusing to sign up for. The idea of a non-expiring "punch card" for seniors was brought up in both meetings to allow seniors to become more active in the Park District. Other focus group members brought up cancellations for programs being announced too late, and the need for a free trial period to allow people to sample different programs. When asked about the customer service provided by the Park District, both groups felt that the staff was highly knowledgeable and helpful, and that customer service was very good.

The focus groups were then asked what they thought was good about the Park District. A common response was the quantity and variety of the parks and programs that are offered. The groups felt that the Park District has done a good job of keeping parks up to date and attractive. On the other side, the groups also had some comments on what was bad about the Park District. One group felt that there is an uneven balance between north and south Hoffman Estates, with the north not having a pool. Goose droppings was also an issue brought up by both groups, as well as a variety of other specific comments about lack of parking and equipment at some Park District facilities.

Establishing better relationships with community partners was another topic of discussion among the focus groups. Many comments were made regarding establishing a partnership with other Park Districts in the area, most notably Schaumburg and Barrington. There were also multiple comments on partnerships with local businesses to create discounts for Park District members. The focus groups also discussed marketing to the diverse population of Hoffman Estates. The use of multilingual volunteers, staff, and classes was an idea shared by both groups. Events that specifically target a diverse population, with ethnic cooking classes being one provided example, was brought up in discussion as well. Overall the groups indicated that making both printed materials and the website available for multiple languages would help incorporate the diverse population into the Park District.

The final discussion question for the focus groups asked what the top priority for the Park District should be. The responses to this question were wide ranging, but a few patterns developed. The importance of a healthy population, specifically children, was universal. The need to supply a growing senior population with programming options and facilities was recognized by both groups. Finally, the groups felt the need to keep updating, renovating, and improving existing facilities and parks, however, some focus group members also pointed out the need to keep the taxes low and to not overdevelop.

The following table displays the combined results from a handout given during the community focus group meetings.

Stakeholder Interview Results

A series of individual one-on-one stakeholder interviews were facilitated by Public Research Group as part of the needs assessment process. The Park District invited selected organizations to participate in these interviews. The data that was generated was analyzed and the individual responses are summarized as follows:

Ms. Vickie Anderson, Hoffman Estates Chamber of Commerce

A stakeholder interview was held with Ms. Vickie Anderson, representing the Hoffman Estates Park District on September 12, 2013. In general, Ms. Anderson believes the Park District is doing a good job. The overall rating she would give the Park District is a 5 which is excellent. As would be expected, she discussed the Park District from the point of view of local business needs. A few of the key items that she stressed were that the Park District offer reduced rates to businesses and community organizations for collaborative ventures and partnerships. Marketing was also an opportunity to be further developed, in particular, social media such as FaceBook.

The opportunities for mentoring, working with local businesses in an entrepreneurial way, and being involved in local business networking events were a few ideas that could be further explored. As with many stakeholders, the whole idea of understanding and working with the changing socioeconomic groups is an important future priority.

Ms. Debbie Ancona, Assistant Superintendent for Administrative Support & Program Evaluation, School District 54

A stakeholder interview was held with Ms. Debbie Ancona, representing the School District 54 on September 12, 2013. In general, Ms. Ancona believes the Park District is working hard to meets the needs of the community. The overall rating she would give the Park District is a 5 which is excellent. The School District is open to increased collaboration among the two agencies. A particular barrier to participation for many youth in the community is the fees are too high to encourage community wide participation. The socioeconomic shift including a growing bi-lingual population will have a large effect on the Park District in the coming years. This will create a need for the Park District to know what is proper and timely. Know what types of programs meet future needs and design new activities and programs around those needs rather than offering general recreational activities that have existed for years. There is much that can be done in working with the children in the community. This has been a consistent message heard in several interviews.

Mr. Jim Norris, Village Manager of Hoffman Estates

A stakeholder interview was held with Mr. Jim Norris, Village Manager on September 10, 2013. In general, he believes the communication and working relationship between the two agency leaders is excellent and holds significant value. He understands the need to have first class parks and recreation is to have a first class community. The overall rating he would give the Park District is a 4.5 which would lie between excellent and very good. Mr. Norris believes the management, facilities and marketing is very good for the Park District. The areas of improvement include kick starting the in-house sports programs which currently leads to a loss of market share for youth sports, the lack of a large sports complex that provides much needed athletic fields, understanding the cost limitations as well as the mixed diversity within the community and finally, the opportunity to build new relationships between the parks department and the public works/community planning departments within the Village.

The ideas to help break down the geographic divide could include holding more special events to bring the community together and help define the identity of the Park District with the interaction of each neighborhood and the large number of churches in Hoffman Estates. The one key area that could improve is to relax on the turf issues between elected officials. This has gotten better over the years but still there is work to be done in this area. In terms of the top priorities for the Park District for the upcoming years in the future, would include the following;

- Do not try to develop expensive facilities. Maintain what you have and look to build any new significant capital projects down the road.
- Work with the Village in securing a large tract of land to build a sports complex. The land is there and needs to be purchased.
- Upgrade to electronic marquee signs at strategic locations.
- Revisit the "no-mow" policy for all ponds located in parks. It makes sense for some, but not for all.

Mr. Jim Britton, Principal of Hoffman Estates High School

A stakeholder interview was held with Mr. Jim Britton, Principal of the Hoffman Estates High School on September 10, 2013. The overall rating he would give the Park District is a 3 which is good. The discussion centered on the need to understand the demographic shift of the community and the kids affected by the need to receive consistent food for nourishment to domestic concerns at home. The one program that he believes will further develop the partnership between the two agencies is the I-Compete program that is scheduled for this month at John Muir Elementary School. He does believe the Village, Park District and School District could be working more closely.

To solve the diversity question and increase participation, he stated that the Park District must go out into the community to engage them. The Park District also must understand that transportation and/or time constraints are barriers to getting kids involved. He believes that there are untapped populations of kids that know very little about the Park District. Mr. Britton has also seen a decline in basic skills in high school athletes. The feeder interface between the Park District, feeder organizations and the high school should be revamped. The facilities for both organizations need to be opened up for better utilization. In closing, Mr. Britton addressed the need to improve and build a better partnership, stressing that fitness for kids and a focus on healthy lifestyles fit within the Park District mission and is equally important to the School District.

Mr. William McLeod, Mayor of Hoffman Estates

A stakeholder interview was held with Mr. William McLeod, Mayor of Hoffman Estates on September 10, 2013. The overall rating he would give the Park District is a 4 which is very good. The discussion centered on seeking partnerships and special events. In terms of marketing, the Mayor believes in total communication which covers all efforts both traditional and electronic.

Conclusions

This study has generated a large amount of data. The data was gathered through a random sample statisically valid community survey, committee visioning session, focus group meetings, one on one stakeholder interviews and staff input and SWOT session. It has become clear that the Hoffman Estates Park District has a significant impact on the community it serves. The Public Research Group believes that much of our analysis provides clear conclusions to the questions that the Park District wanted input in the assessment process. The needs assessment provides the building blocks for future planning from both internal and external goals and objectives development. It is easy to develop a few key themes into the three core functional areas that the Park District operates. These include;

Administrative:

- The Hoffman Estates Park District contributes significantly to the quality of life in the Village.
- Traditional marketing methods are still important to reach residents.
- A focus on Information Technology within the Park District needs to be developed.
- Overall satisfaction with programs, parks and facilities are good, but work can be done to increase scores.
- The website has reached its full potential as a marketing/information tool. Explore ways to ease navigation and enrich content for the user.

Recreation:

- Active fitness & wellness programs for adults, seniors and youth along with special events are
 program area needs.
- The Park District not offering services along with pricing are barriers to program participation.
- The variety of programs offered provided strong numbers of satisfaction.
- A focus on future programs would target the changing socioeconomic status of the community. There is much work to be done in this area.
- E-mail blasts, the Park District website, as well as the program guide are the primary ways residents learn about the program offerings.

Parks & Facilities:

- Parks are used by the community and are generally well kept.
- Passive park amenities are favored as important to the community that include walking/biking paths, natural areas and open space.
- The top rated actions include expanding the existing daily activity space for senior/active adult at the Triphahn Center, developing a splash pad in a park north of I-90 and providing a new indoor multi-purpose sports facility.

The Hoffman Estates Park District works hard to reach a community split by significant geographic divides. The changing community is a result of shifting socioeconomic factors. The allied governmental agencies such as the Village and local School Districts are encountering the same challenges. The Park District needs to understand this dynamic as future plans are developed to complete the circle of community services for parks and recreation enjoyment.

Partnerships with other organizations and newsletter for pertinent information; register for programs that are not filled from another park district (share thru networking); eliminate the non-resident fee; discount tickets thru local businesses; partner with charities

- Provide more broad based special class offerings geared to meet a variety of comprehensive community needs such as women's entrepreneurial groups and workshops, women's issues seminars, single mom support groups, self-confidence workshops, parenting classes and babysitting services
- Address the have and have not issues with the socioeconomic groups so lower income families have access to Park District programs, activities and facilities
- Work with businesses in the area to obtain scholarships which would provide for individuals and youth in need
- Development of Park District community education programs for youth
- Collaborate with local businesses to generate mentor groups to support a variety of diverse youth and adult needs. Mentor groups could operate in Park District facilities
- 7. During the next five years, what should the top priorities be for the Hoffman Estates Park District?
- Provide access to programs and facilities to all socioeconomic groups
- Address cultural diversity needs and issues. Also, be aware and sensitive to cultural diversity needs. Develop recreational programs to meets these needs. Certain sports programs and recreational activities don't match and meet specific ethnic group interests. For example, different ethnic groups are interested in different types of sports and recreational activities than other populations in the community.
- Sponsor volunteer activities for underprivileged youth
- Provide youth education, training and advocacy programs
- Reassess senior needs and expand Park District senior services and program offerings
- Partner with other Park Districts and businesses to provide expanded services. For example, the Park District could partner with hospitals to provide wellness and health related programs. Another example would be to partner with other local Park Districts to provide reciprocal pool and water park privileges, community center fitness center usage, and special events.

Stakeholder Interview Responses- Ms. Debbie Ancona

- 1. What are the strengths of the Hoffman Estates Park District? (What is working well?)
- The willingness by the Park District to collaborate with schools and businesses to assess needs and participate in providing community services and programs to enhance and improve the community is excellent
- The before and after school program partnership between the Park District and District 54 is a valuable asset to the community and it runs the program efficiently
- 2. What are the weaknesses? (What is not working?)
- Many parents are unable to have their children participate in before and after school childcare programs provided by the Park District because they cannot afford childcare fees. A suggestion to improve the program would be for the Park District to charge no fees for before and after school programs for specific, qualified low income families.
- The same Park District recreational program fees exist for all community residents. Fees are too high for many residents to participate. Different fee rates need to be established for different income groups.

- 4. What do you think is the best method of marketing the Hoffman Estates Park District facilities and activities?
- The program brochure is the first place the overall majority of the population goes to access Park District activities, recreation services, and community education program information provided by the Park District. Therefore, brochure should be clearly defined, specific and detailed.
- Ask the kids in the community as well as schools what their needs and interests are instead of focusing solely on adult input
- Sponsor Park District special events within the community which would draw large sectors of the population. For example, could sponsor a treasure hunt fitness obstacle course.
- The special events peaks community interest, draws residents to the Park District, addresses wellness issues, provides community education in wellness areas, and affords the Park District the opportunity to inform residents of Park District programs, recreational offerings and facilities
- Develop a Park District cable television station. Children will inform parents of Park District activities which interest them.
- 5. What needs to improve to develop better partnership opportunities between your organization and the Park District?
- The Park District needs more articulation of ideas with School District administration to generate and provide effective collaboration community endeavors for Hoffman Estates youth. It is advantageous to learn youth program needs, parental needs and community needs.
- Park District needs to initiate the communication with School District stating they would like to explore additional community need based partnerships with School District in a variety of youth related areas
- School District will respond to Park District initiation. Key School District contact;

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- 6. What ideas could you provide to help the Park District develop strategies to help break down the geographic divides in the community?
- School District administration believes geographic divides in the community exist primarily because of socioeconomic problems and issues. Therefore, the Park District could partner with School District 54 to provide social emotional programs for a large section of the community's youth. The School District could provide volunteer psychologists and social workers to work with Park District offered classes at the community center to offer services such as parenting classes, youth mentoring programs, etc.
- The Park District could also provide babysitting services at their facilities and address special needs training for Park District instructors to work with special needs groups such as autistic children. This way, the Park District needs of those children may be addressed as well.
- The Park District could also sponsor large community social events in a variety of geographic locations that would attract many diverse groups (ethnic and otherwise) thereby getting program information out to a wider variety of the population and preventing some of the geographic divide issues. One idea which would attract many sectors of the population would be for the Park District to sponsor an American Idol type of event. The Elk Grove Park District has tried this calling it Elk Grove IDOL and it has been a successful draw for the Park District. It was also a successful unifying event.
- Another issue regarding youth advocacy could be addressed by the Park District partnering with the Hoffman Estates Police Department. The police department has a peer jury program for youth offenders where the peer jury decides the punishment for the youth crime. Rather than youth offenders picking up garbage, perhaps the Park District could provide some sort of work volunteers' opportunities which would open the door for these children to see what the Park District has to offer thereby illustrating other productive outlets such as recreational pursuits.
- Another option to assist in breaking down the geographic divide would be for the Park District to partner with the School District in providing either a work study program or volunteer work programs for students where they work in various capacities with Park District programs or services. An educational youth stipend could also be provided for this type of joint venture. This program would be designed for lower income family students.
- 7. During the next five years, what should the top priorities be for the Hoffman Estates Park District?
- Know what is proper and timely. Know what types of programs meet future needs and design new activities and programs around those needs rather than offering general recreational activities that have existed for years.
- Asses what types of recreational programs and community services the community desires. Assess what recreational programs and community services are offered in the private sectors and duplicate and integrate those activities and services into Park District programs.
- Address minority needs as well as specific ethnic/cultural needs. Over 50% of Hanover Park residents include minorities. Assess these needs and offer appropriate programs which would be useful to specific ethnic and minority groups.
- Become aware and respond to early childhood and school age bilingual population needs
- Be productive, communicate and partner with senior housing facilities to provide better and stronger Park District community based programs for seniors. The Park District needs to ask the seniors themselves and then assess the types of services and recreational programs seniors want and provide those services.
