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MINUTES RECREATION COMMITTEE MEETING January 16, 2018

2. Approval of Agenda:

Comm Rep Neel made a motion, seconded by Commissioner R. Evans to approve the agenda as presented. The motion carried by voice vote.

6. New Business:

A. Independent Contractor Agreements/M18-004:

Director Kies reviewed the item noting that the only change from past agreements was that the district felt they could run the Pickle Ball in-house rather than having First Serve run it.

President Kaplan asked about the percentage difference on the Karate and Director Kies noted that it was because it was run at their facility and not ours.

Commissioner K. Evans noted that there were typos to be addressed; the Tumbling Times & Shotokan text contract has 2 extraneous "@" 3rd paragraph and the word "sole" is repeated in the 1st paragraph of VIII.

Commissioner Bickham questioned if there were only 3 contracts and Deputy Director Talsma noted that staff believed there were only 3 that would require coming before the board.

Comm Rep Henderson questioned why they were seeing them for the first time and Deputy Director Talsma explained that in the past because no single payment had been beyond the Executive Director's authority, none of the outside contracts had come before the board. Now since the change to policy and it is the cost of the entire contract, there were 3 that were beyond the Executive Director's authority and so have been brought to committee and then to the board for approval.

Commissioner R. Evans made a motion, seconded by Comm Rep Neel to recommend the board approve the annual agreements with Tumbling Times, Inc., Illinois Shotokan Karate, Inc. and First Serve Management, Inc. as corrected. The motion carried by voice vote.

B. Rec, Fac & Golf Report and 4Q2017 Goals/M18-002:

Director Kies reviewed the report thanking BPC and staff for the terrific job on the Winter Festival noting that it had the most attendance yet.

Comm Rep Henderson asked about the fish fry and Director Bechtold explained that it was cod and would have a feature fish each week.

Director Bechtold reviewed the golf portion of the report noting that there had been golf in December. He also explained that BPC Chef Cesar Betancourt was taking a new position effective January 26 and the district

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would be advertising. He noted that they still had their Sous Chef on staff and that it was a quiet time of the season.

He explained that the pipes would be repaired in time for the February 3 event and that they had not had to cancel any events due to the water damage.

Comm Rep Wittkamp made a motion, seconded by Comm Rep Neel to send the Board Report and 4Q2017 Goals/ M18-002 to the board as presented. The motion carried by voice vote.

RE: Willow Recreation Center & Vogelei Barn Flooring Bid, Supply and Delivery

Background:

Through the Comprehensive Master Plan/Capital Improvement process, it was decided to replace a percentage of current facility carpet and tile within the Willow Recreation Center (WRC). It was also determined during this same process that all of the tile flooring at Vogelei Barn needs replacement at this time. The location of carpet replacement at WRC includes rooms 2, the meeting room and parts of preschool rooms 3 & 4. The tile replacement at WRC includes parts of preschool rooms 3, 4 and the preschool hallway, washrooms plus the preschool kitchen.

The tile replacement at Vogelei Barn includes all of the lower level; teen center, hallway, vestibule, bathrooms and 2 staircase landings. The upper level includes the storage room, kitchen and office area.

Implications:

Staff went out to bid and notifications of the bid packet availability was announced through the Daily Herald, promoted on the Bid Tools website, and e-mailed to several vendors.

A total of 2 bids were opened and publicly read. The results for the supply and delivery for flooring for WRC and Vogelei Barn were opened on January 23, 2018 at 10:00 am. Attached is a copy of the bid results.

The low bidder was Scharm Flooring Inc. of Des Plaines IL. Scharm Flooring Inc. has performed work for the park district in the past including work at WRC, TC and PSS&WC. The performance of Scharm Flooring Inc. has met all of staff's expectations in past with our previous projects. The materials provided during those projects were of good quality.

The total bid provided by Scharm Flooring Inc. for the carpet and tile along with adhesive is \$27,323.00; which is within the total budget allotted for these projects (\$28,000.00).

It is important to note as specified in the bid packet that the HEPD Park Maintenance staff will be installing the carpet.

Recommendations:

Staff recommends that the Recreation Committee recommend to the full board that the bid project be awarded to Scharm Flooring Inc. for the total amount of \$27,323.00.

Background

According to the definition from Wikipedia, "the Balanced Scorecard (BSC) is a strategy performance management tool - a semi-standard structured report, supported by design methods and automation tools, that can be used by managers to keep track of the execution of activities by the staff within their control and to monitor the consequences arising from these actions"

The phrase 'Balanced scorecard' is commonly used in two broad forms:

- 1. As individual scorecards that contain measures to manage performance, those scorecards may be operational or have a more strategic intent; and
- 2. As a Strategic Management System, as originally defined by Kaplan & Norton.

Key components in utilizing the Balanced Scorecard methodology

- its focus on the strategic agenda of the organization concerned
- the selection of a small number of data items to monitor
- a mix of financial and non-financial data items."

Implications

The District continues to refine our Balanced Scorecard and have made certain adjustments to ensure that the measurement values that we utilize are relevant and functional. The goal is to provide a snapshot view of these key components at a specific point in time and to have an annual year to year comparison. This allows us to determine on a very broad spectrum the direction in which the District is moving.

These key components are not being analyzed on a valuation to current budgets or forecasts as much as to the same time period in previous years. Those types of evaluations are provided in the monthly Recreation Committee participation reports and the financial statements in the A&F Committee reports. The Balanced Scorecard comparison gives us a broad overview as to the direction the District is moving with regard to our overall mission, values and goals. The Balanced Scorecard has been updated to report quarterly numbers and compare these numbers to previous quarters. This is then done for the year to date (YTD) totals as well.

Certain numbers that are included may have changed and if significant we have included a small note under the measurement definition.

Recommendation

Staff recommends the Board approve the Balanced Scorecard for the 4th Quarter 2017.

Summary & Monthly Highlights

- Heparks Kiosk For the past several years we have had a kiosk in the lobby at the Alexian Brothers Women and Children's Hospital. It is in a low traffic area, and the C&M team felt it needed more exposure and a better ROI; so the kiosk will soon be moved to the Village lobby. The sign will be redesigned to include the Village's logo. The Kiosk has a TV screen that displays ads promoting our events and programs, the same as what is displayed in our lobby. Going forward, once it's moved to the Village it will also contain ads for Village events. In addition, it has holders for Heparks fliers/Guides.
- The Recreation and Facilities Division is hosting a first time NEW job fair for seasonal and part time employees on Saturday, March 3rd from 9:30-11:30 at the Triphahn Center. All park district departments that employ part time/seasonal staff will be participating in order to get a jump start on hiring for the spring and summer seasons.
- The first ever 50+ Center Open House and Member Appreciation Week was held the week of January 22nd-26th. Current and potential members were invited to participate in any of the drop-in programs, clubs, and athletic based activities free of charge that week. The event was well received with approximately 12 new members joining.
- Youth athletic leagues are underway and are showing signs of success right off the bat! Participation numbers are up by 7; our 7th grade boys feeder team already brought home one championship; Girls Feeder Basketball is back and have already competed in over 12 games during January; and our first 3rd/4th grade tournament team (Jr. Hawks) competed in two AAU tournaments in January, and is receiving a lot of positive feedback!
- The Early Learning and Care Center (ELC) is growing by leaps and bounds! Seven new children have started since November, with a number of additional inquiries, and the new room that was opened in September is almost maxed out.
- NEW, PSS&WC assumed full coordination of indoor Pickleball during the month of January, which was previously coordinated by the district's contractual tennis provider. Efforts were taken to ensure a smooth and seamless transition for participants.
- NEW this winter: PSSWC is offering a Parent/child climbing class. Both parent and child will learn to climb, but parents will also be taught to belay and by the end of the class will be certified at Prairie Stone to belay for a year from the date of completion.
- HEParks has a signed agreement with A Closer Bond and will begin offering NEW basic obedience classes along with a class on Dog Park Etiquette and a class for children called "Can I pet that Dog?" in the spring session.
- The Recreation and Facilities department attended the IAPD/IPRA state conference in Chicago during the month of January. Based on the summaries and feedback they gained a lot of experience, education and training on various trending and updates within the industry locally, state wide and nationally. Director Kies was the Chair of the conference from the professional side and Tom Barz (from Frankfort Park District and Chairman of the IAPD) was the Chair of the conference form elected official standpoint. Overall the state conference was well received by all attendees, as communicated during the conference wrap up meeting. Staff look forward to implementing some these new initiatives.

Volunteers Summary

- Human Resources processed 9 new volunteers.
- Foundation had a GNO Committee meeting w/5 volunteers, an Executive Committee meeting with 3 volunteers and a Quarterly Meeting with 15 volunteers for a total of 36 hours.
- PSSWC has a volunteer to take care of their plants who spent 3.25 hours donating her time.
- The district was contacted by Vistex, Sears, Beth Tikvah Congregation and the High School for volunteer and LCAP hours. LCAPs are being assigned as they come in and the other corporation groups are being assigned opportunities coming in April.



Youth Winter Basketball League, Feeder Basketball and Tournament Teams

- January was the start to a new season. On Saturday, January 6th, we had our opening day for our in-house teams. This was week 1 of a 10-week season for our in-house teams.
- Heading into February, our in house teams will be voting for their representatives for All-Star weekend on February 17th. Each team grades 3rd-8th vote three players into the all-star game.
- Boys Feeder basketball competed in the Prospect High School Shootout and both the A and B Palatine High School shootouts in January. The 7th grade team brought home the championship at the Palatine A tournament.
- Girls Feeder Basketball competed in over 12 games during January, hosting games at the Triphahn Center and traveling to other high schools like Norte Dame, St. Viator, Carey Grove and Main South.
- 3rd/4th Grade Tournament Team (Jr. Hawks) competed in two more AAU tournaments in January. This is the first season we have offered a "tournament team" at this level. We have received a lot of positive feedback with this group and hope it is a great lead in to our feeder programs.

Indoor 3 v 3 soccer

- On Sunday, January 7th, HEPD hosted an "open gym" to encourage players to register for our 3v3 indoor league that started on January 14th. 3 players registered after the open gym for the NEW league, which increase the total number of registrants to 37.
- January 14th was opening day for the 3 v 3 indoor soccer leagues. A total of 37 players are currently enrolled.

Spring Soccer Leagues

• Registration opened up for spring players on January 28th. Practice begins the first week in April and games will start the weekend of April 21st and 22nd.

In-house Youth Baseball and Softball

- Baseball/Softball registration is underway. An early bird discount was offered up until January 31st. Players who registered early received \$20 off the regular price and got to participate in our off-season program held on the new athletic performance area.
- On January 21st we hosted our first ever clinic at the athletic performance area at T.C. Players worked on their stance by hitting off the tee, worked on ground balls, practiced hand-eye coordination with soft toss, and were introduced to pitching off a mound at the younger levels. This is a great addition to our program and helps up keep pace with other towns that have big indoor facilities to use like Schaumburg, Palatine and Barrington.

Staff is currently seeing more active members which is the goal, as compared to just having members who were paying the fee and not participating or only using it for trip preregistration.

Marketing Plan- 50+

- The first ever Open House and Member Appreciation week was held the week of January 22nd-26th. Current and potential members were invited to participate in any of the drop-in programs, clubs, and athletic based activities free of charge that week. The event was well received with approximately 12 new members joining.
- Additional events offered the week of this open house included: Lunch & Learn (20 attended), Coffee Talk, Ask a Pharmacist (7 attended), Health Screenings (3 attended), Pub Quiz (33 attended), Lunch & Learn/How to Facebook (44 attended).
- We identified a 50+ community in west Hoffman Estates called Haverford Place. There are about 500 households in that community with people age 55-85. A few of those community members are members of our 50+ Center but others from that development only use PSSWC. C&M has sent a marketing piece to those homes in hopes of boosting additional membership from this community in 2018. Staff will also be meeting with their Board of Directors sometime in early 2018 during one of their board meetings to share what our center has to offer to their community.







Member Services

- from the formidable performance to close out FY17 a robust 37 members ahead of the annual net goal. The team worked to continue with new membership promotional and recruitment efforts in January that included a \$49 enrollment fee or an option to purchase a 'Kickstart' Fitness Package. This specially designed enrollment package priced at \$249 was launched as an option for those clients seeking a more comprehensive fitness experience as it included 5 personal training sessions, a 3-pack of guest passes, and a \$0 enrollment special enrollment incentive. The package proved to be popular as a total of 9 new members purchased it in January.
- The PSS&WC enrollment special was advertised comprehensively through each of the following means throughout the month of January:
 - o 30K full page 2-sided direct mail postcard (targeted mailing in first week of Jan)
 - District's electronic marquee signs throughout the community
 - VHE electronic marquee signs located at the corner of Shoe Factory Road and Beverly
 - o The ENROLLMENT FEE banner on the north side building exterior
 - Select Facebook posts throughout the month
 - o Guest and tour follow up targeted email via Retention Management
 - Both internal and e-based targeted marketing were utilized to inspire member referrals as well as to reach all HEPD clients throughout the community. The HEPD bi-monthly Eblast included the enrollment promotion details, and targeted emails through Retention Management continued to be sent throughout the month to promote the club cash incentive for member referrals.
 - HEPD and PSS&WC websites (scrolling banner updates)
 - Chamber of Commerce monthly newsletter
 - App audio banner (digital audio app for members via the in-house fitness equipment audio system).
 - Targeted email via Retention Management to all cancelled members dating back to June 2017
- The Member Services team initiated a targeted corporate enrollment campaign that
 included visits to 13 of the existing established corporate accounts to promote a
 limited time enrollment special offer to each. Follow up visits and contact will be
 made throughout Q1 with these select corporations in an effort to inspire additional
 enrollment interest among employees.
- With competition within the area continuing to increase (most recently with the addition of an Orangetheory Fitness location opening in Hoffman Estates in early FY18) as well as with surging interest in personal fitness options offered via digital means (i.e. apps, wearable technology, on-demand streaming options), efforts to recruit new members will be complimented with efforts to retain current members. These efforts include additional attention to creating multiple 'touch points' with new members during their first 30 -45 days of membership, particularly through the sale of personal training packages at the time of enrollment and through the promotion of equipment orientations and fitness assessments.
- The Member Services team continued to effectively manage the suspension list (30, 60, 90 day 'kick outs') throughout the month of January, resulting in just 7 90-day

- cancellations for the month (matching the record low from Jan 2017). Cancellations numbered just 81 members, which was 11 fewer than those lost in Jan 2017.
- The Member Services team coordinated a month full of special events in January for members to inspire continued usage interest (see January wellness calendar image below). Events included the promotion of special fitness activities along with recognition of special member 'fun' days that promote retention. The Member Services team also launched a new annual series of online motivational videos that are loaded weekly on Tuesdays on social media (Facebook and Instagram) to help motivate members to pursue fitness goals. Entitled 'Tuesday Tips with Trainers', these inspiring and educational videos are designed to motivate members to try new workout options within the facility during workouts.
- Efforts are continuing for the set up and design of the new club app designed by NetPulse that would increase the digital reach of the facility and strengthen the marketing and retention strategies by the Member Services team. The new club app would provide a user friendly platform of club related options that include fitness challenges, guest recruitment, push notifications, club check in capabilities, and a member news feed. The app would also have an integrated link to the App Audio app that is currently on order, which will provide audio links to the facility TV's. The development of the club app will take place during Q4 with a formal launch to members in Q1 FY18.

Operations and Fitness Departments:

- PSS&WC held a Nutrition Workshop, Belly Busters, on 2/6, taught by Zac Marshall. The seminar had 10 participants.
- Group fitness class numbers continue to increase early in the first quarter.
- The Personal Training department increased retention efforts with 9 trainer led workshops during the month of January. These workshops will be continued every other month for all of 2018.
- PSS&WC assumed full coordination of indoor Pickleball during the month of January, which was previously coordinated by the district's contractual tennis provider. Efforts were taken to ensure a smooth and seamless transition for participants.
- Gymnasium rentals were plentiful during the month of January taking care through careful and strategic scheduling to ensure that member usage privileges were not impeded.

Aquatics and Programming Departments:

• Swim lessons winter session 2 begins February 20. The first session of winter which is typically the lowest session of the season ended with 172 participants. This is 35 participants above 2017's total of 132. We are currently taking registration for winter session 2.

- 4 members participated in our belay certification class that was held on Monday January 22. The belay certification is held the third Monday of every month from 8pm-10pm. Our hopes are to attract more adults to the climbing wall.
- Climbing Wall Safety Inspection is scheduled for February 15.
- Kids First Sports programs are going strong. Both basketball and soccer are running this first session with 22 participants.










Conversion Rate – What percentage registered online?



Brookdale Hoffman Estates, an independent-living and assisted-living community for seniors, was honored with the Chairman's Award.

Incoming Chairwoman Jennifer Walker of Tate & Lyle Americas praised the leadership of chamber Executive Director Tricia O'Brien, who last year brought the organization up to 335 members, started its taking a stand on issues affecting businesses, and personally earned an accreditation held by only 35 chamber leaders in Illinois.

He helped change state leg-He helped change state leg-islation to allow for a highway billboard to secure a partner-ship with the Chicago Wolves. The partnership secured funding for construction of a new ice facility. He part-nered with many other local municipalities as well to promunicipalnies as well to pro-vide services to the commu-nity, and formed private part-nerships raising more than \$500,000 in sponsorships. Bostrom also co-founded the Friends of HE Parks

Foundation in 1999. Under his tenure, the park district won many presti-gious awards, including National Gold Medal from the National Recreation and Parks Association in 2009. Accreditation by the Commission for Accreditation for Parks and Recreation in 2014 and 2018, and also accredited by the IAPD/IPRA annually since 1999 and the Park District Risk Management Association from 2010 to the

present.
The Illinois Policy Institute awarded the park district its Sunshine Award for govern-ment transparency in 2013. The Hoffman Estates Chamber of Commerce awarded the park district its Public Sector of the Year award in 2013 and

2015.
"I want to thank all the colleagues I've worked with over the years," added Bostrom. "I've had some great mentors throughout my career, start-ing straight out of grad school. These people have had such a tremendous influence on my life and my career at Hoffman. I just want to thank everybody. It's been a great ride."
