EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

February 2018

PARKS DIVISION

All tasks performed in January by Parks and Facilities staff were completed in house unless noted in the individual line items below.

- 1. Five Parks and Facilities staff members attended IAPD State Conference.
- 2. Two Staff members attended the Illinois Turfgrass Foundation Winter Education Seminars.
- 3. CAPRA accreditation for Parks & Facilities was ongoing during January and is almost completed.
- 4. Staff handled snow and/or ice removal at all facilities.
- 5. Water meter readings were completed on a weekly basis.
- 6. Two heat exchangers for our shop RTU'S and an inducer draft motor were replaced.
- 7. Both sets of pressure switches on rink 1 dehumidifiers at TC were replaced.
- 8. Replaced a high limit switch on rink 2 dehumidifier at TC.
- 9. An inducer draft motor and ignitor were replaced on RTU-12 at TC.
- 10. New gate valve was installed for the water fill in TC spa.
- 11. Constructed a new multipurpose score board for Bridges.
- 12. Replaced numerous areas of cove base at TC.
- 13. Chipper box for small dump truck bed was completed
- 14. Prices for ADA concerns were compiled for all facilities and a report is in the process of being written.
- 15. Ash tree removals in the natural area at Black Bear are under way along with regular tree maintenance.
- 16. Seascape deck chair repairs were started and will be completed when additional parts arrive.
- 17. A volunteer project with the Boy Scouts was completed on Jan. 12th. Boy Scouts and their parents worked with four staff members at the maintenance building to build 12 Wood Duck boxes which we will install in the spring. These will be installed in the small ponds in our natural area parks at Essex Park, Walnut Pond & Black Bear.
- 18. Staff completed ice checks on a weekly basis, complemented by photos of the ice depth to insure proper thickness and safety for ice use.
- 19. Four equipment trailers were cleaned and painted.

- 20. Our aquatic weed control program for all district's ponds was reviewed with a representative from SePro, giving us water depths, plant life issues and recommendations. Staff then reviewed the recommendations and has developed our aquatic weed control program.
- 21. Vehicle 500 had the right rear wheel bearing, right front axle, thermostat housing, and belt and right front stabilizer link replaced.
- 22. Vehicle 499 had the rotted brake line, muffler, alternator, blower motor resistor with harness and battery replaced.
- 23. Plow harness was replaced on truck 503.
- 24. Equipment 505 the computer was reprogrammed for manual regeneration.
- 25. Vehicle 506 had the front pads and rear brake shoes and repacked front wheel bearings replaced.
- 26. Completed maintenance and repairs on all ballfield groomers, stripers and chipper.
- 27. Replaced batteries on vehicles 498,485 and 501.
- 28. Truck 504 had a right side tie rod and alignment completed.
- 29. Emission tests were completed on vehicles 499 and 501.
- 30. Trailer 836 had new tires installed.

PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT

1. PSSWC Wet Areas:

Staff is currently working with Opcon construction and their sub-contractors to remove existing grout residual and grout haze from the surface of the tiles installed as part of the renovation project. Unfortunately we used epoxy grout which is not easily removed once it is cured. A number of stripers have been tried unsuccessfully and it has been determined that the only way to remove the grout is to physically scrape it off. Given the area affected, this process will take some time to complete and it will be done during after hours at no cost to the district. The park district is currently holding approximately \$9,000 of its final payment.

2. Playground Installations:

With the playground vendor bid opening February 6, the district can now complete the installation plans and specifications that will be released by February 16th. This will allow contractors approximately 3 weeks to bid on this project with a bid opening date of March 13, 2018.

3. Asphalt Paving Repair Projects:

Staff has completed the bid packages for asphalt repair work that will include PSSWC, Cannon Crossings and Freedom Run. These bids will be due on March 13, 2018 and presented to the March B&G Committee.

Summary & Monthly Highlights

- Heparks Kiosk For the past several years we have had a kiosk in the lobby at the Alexian Brothers Women and Children's Hospital. It is in a low traffic area, and the C&M team felt it needed more exposure and a better ROI; so the kiosk will soon be moved to the Village lobby. The sign will be redesigned to include the Village's logo. The Kiosk has a TV screen that displays ads promoting our events and programs, the same as what is displayed in our lobby. Going forward, once it's moved to the Village it will also contain ads for Village events. In addition, it has holders for Heparks fliers/Guides.
- The Recreation and Facilities Division is hosting a first time NEW job fair for seasonal and part time employees on Saturday, March 3rd from 9:30-11:30 at the Triphahn Center. All park district departments that employ part time/seasonal staff will be participating in order to get a jump start on hiring for the spring and summer seasons.
- The first ever 50+ Center Open House and Member Appreciation Week was held the week of January 22nd-26th. Current and potential members were invited to participate in any of the drop-in programs, clubs, and athletic based activities free of

- charge that week. The event was well received with approximately 12 new members joining.
- Youth athletic leagues are underway and are showing signs of success right off the bat! Participation numbers are up by 7; our 7th grade boys feeder team already brought home one championship; Girls Feeder Basketball is back and have already competed in over 12 games during January; and our first 3rd/4th grade tournament team (Jr. Hawks) competed in two AAU tournaments in January, and is receiving a lot of positive feedback!
- The Early Learning and Care Center (ELC) is growing by leaps and bounds!
 Seven new children have started since November, with a number of additional inquiries, and the new room that was opened in September is almost maxed out.
- NEW, PSS&WC assumed full coordination of indoor Pickleball during the month of January, which was previously coordinated by the district's contractual tennis provider. Efforts were taken to ensure a smooth and seamless transition for participants.
- NEW this winter: PSSWC is offering a Parent/child climbing class. Both parent and child will learn to climb, but parents will also be taught to belay and by the end of the class will be certified at Prairie Stone to belay for a year from the date of completion.
- HEParks has a signed agreement with A Closer Bond and will begin offering NEW basic obedience classes along with a class on Dog Park Etiquette and a class for children called "Can I pet that Dog?" in the spring session.
- The Recreation and Facilities department attended the IAPD/IPRA state conference in Chicago during the month of January. Based on the summaries and feedback they gained a lot of experience, education and training on various trending and updates within the industry locally, state wide and nationally. Director Kies was the Chair of the conference from the professional side and Tom Barz (from Frankfort Park District and Chairman of the IAPD) was the Chair of the conference form elected official standpoint. Overall the state conference was well received by all attendees, as communicated during the conference wrap up meeting. Staff look forward to implementing some these new initiatives.

Volunteers Summary

- Human Resources processed 9 new volunteers.
- Foundation had a GNO Committee meeting w/5 volunteers, an Executive Committee meeting with 3 volunteers and a Quarterly Meeting with 15 volunteers for a total of 36 hours.
- PSSWC has a volunteer to take care of their plants who spent 3.25 hours donating her time.
- The district was contacted by Vistex, Sears, Beth Tikvah Congregation and the High School for volunteer and LCAP hours. LCAPs are being assigned as they come in and the other corporation groups are being assigned opportunities coming in April.



Youth Winter Basketball League, Feeder Basketball and Tournament Teams

- January was the start to a new season. On Saturday, January 6th, we had our opening day for our in-house teams. This was week 1 of a 10-week season for our in-house teams.
- Heading into February, our in house teams will be voting for their representatives for All-Star weekend on February 17th. Each team grades 3rd-8th vote three players into the all-star game.
- Boys Feeder basketball competed in the Prospect High School Shootout and both the A and B Palatine High School shootouts in January. The 7th grade team brought home the championship at the Palatine A tournament.
- Girls Feeder Basketball competed in over 12 games during January, hosting games at the Triphahn Center and traveling to other high schools like Norte Dame, St. Viator, Carey Grove and Main South.
- 3rd/4th Grade Tournament Team (Jr. Hawks) competed in two more AAU tournaments in January. This is the first season we have offered a "tournament team" at this level. We have received a lot of positive feedback with this group and hope it is a great lead in to our feeder programs.

Indoor 3 v 3 soccer

- On Sunday, January 7th, HEPD hosted an "open gym" to encourage players to register for our 3v3 indoor league that started on January 14th. 3 players registered after the open gym for the NEW league, which increase the total number of registrants to 37.
- January 14th was opening day for the 3 v 3 indoor soccer leagues. A total of 37 players are currently enrolled.

- The first ever Open House and Member Appreciation week was held the week of January 22nd-26th. Current and potential members were invited to participate in any of the drop-in programs, clubs, and athletic based activities free of charge that week. The event was well received with approximately 12 new members joining.
- Additional events offered the week of this open house included: Lunch & Learn (20 attended), Coffee Talk, Ask a Pharmacist (7 attended), Health Screenings (3 attended), Pub Quiz (33 attended), Lunch & Learn/How to Facebook (44 attended).
- We identified a 50+ community in west Hoffman Estates called Haverford Place. There are about 500 households in that community with people age 55-85. A few of those community members are members of our 50+ Center but others from that development only use PSSWC. C&M has sent a marketing piece to those homes in hopes of boosting additional membership from this community in 2018. Staff will also be meeting with their Board of Directors sometime in early 2018 during one of their board meetings to share what our center has to offer to their community.







Member Services

- The Member Services team began the New Year with strong momentum resulting from the formidable performance to close out FY17 a robust 37 members ahead of the annual net goal. The team worked to continue with new membership promotional and recruitment efforts in January that included a \$49 enrollment fee or an option to purchase a 'Kickstart' Fitness Package. This specially designed enrollment package priced at \$249 was launched as an option for those clients seeking a more comprehensive fitness experience as it included 5 personal training sessions, a 3-pack of guest passes, and a \$0 enrollment special enrollment incentive. The package proved to be popular as a total of 9 new members purchased it in January.
- The PSS&WC enrollment special was advertised comprehensively through each of the following means throughout the month of January:
 - 30K full page 2-sided direct mail postcard (targeted mailing in first week of Jan)
 - o District's electronic marquee signs throughout the community
 - VHE electronic marquee signs located at the corner of Shoe Factory Road and Beverly
 - The ENROLLMENT FEE banner on the north side building exterior
 - Select Facebook posts throughout the month
 - o Guest and tour follow up targeted email via Retention Management
 - o Both internal and e-based targeted marketing were utilized to inspire member referrals as well as to reach all HEPD clients throughout the community. The HEPD bi-monthly Eblast included the enrollment promotion details, and targeted emails through Retention Management continued to be sent throughout the month to promote the club cash incentive for member referrals.
 - HEPD and PSS&WC websites (scrolling banner updates)
 - Chamber of Commerce monthly newsletter
 - App audio banner (digital audio app for members via the in-house fitness equipment audio system).
 - Targeted email via Retention Management to all cancelled members dating back to June 2017
- The Member Services team initiated a targeted corporate enrollment campaign that included visits to 13 of the existing established corporate accounts to promote a limited time enrollment special offer to each. Follow up visits and contact will be made throughout Q1 with these select corporations in an effort to inspire additional enrollment interest among employees.
- With competition within the area continuing to increase (most recently with the addition of an Orangetheory Fitness location opening in Hoffman Estates in early FY18) as well as with surging interest in personal fitness options offered via digital means (i.e. apps, wearable technology, on-demand streaming options), efforts to recruit new members will be complimented with efforts to retain current members. These efforts include additional attention to creating multiple 'touch points' with new members during their first 30 -45 days of membership, particularly through the sale of personal training packages at the time of

- enrollment and through the promotion of equipment orientations and fitness assessments.
- The Member Services team continued to effectively manage the suspension list (30, 60, 90 day 'kick outs') throughout the month of January, resulting in just 7 90day cancellations for the month (matching the record low from Jan 2017). Cancellations numbered just 81 members, which was 11 fewer than those lost in Jan 2017.
- The Member Services team coordinated a month full of special events in January for members to inspire continued usage interest (see January wellness calendar image below). Events included the promotion of special fitness activities along with recognition of special member 'fun' days that promote retention. The Member Services team also launched a new annual series of online motivational videos that are loaded weekly on Tuesdays on social media (Facebook and Instagram) to help motivate members to pursue fitness goals. Entitled 'Tuesday Tips with Trainers', these inspiring and educational videos are designed to motivate members to try new workout options within the facility during workouts.
- NetPulse that would increase the digital reach of the facility and strengthen the marketing and retention strategies by the Member Services team. The new club app would provide a user friendly platform of club related options that include fitness challenges, guest recruitment, push notifications, club check in capabilities, and a member news feed. The app would also have an integrated link to the App Audio app that is currently on order, which will provide audio links to the facility TV's. The development of the club app will take place during Q4 with a formal launch to members in Q1 FY18.

Operations and Fitness Departments:

- PSS&WC held a Nutrition Workshop, Belly Busters, on 2/6, taught by Zac Marshall. The seminar had 10 participants.
- Group fitness class numbers continue to increase early in the first quarter.
- The Personal Training department increased retention efforts with 9 trainer led workshops during the month of January. These workshops will be continued every other month for all of 2018.
- PSS&WC assumed full coordination of indoor Pickleball during the month of January, which was previously coordinated by the district's contractual tennis provider. Efforts were taken to ensure a smooth and seamless transition for participants.
- Gymnasium rentals were plentiful during the month of January taking care through careful and strategic scheduling to ensure that member usage privileges were not impeded.

Aquatics and Programming Departments:

• Swim lessons winter session 2 begins February 20. The first session of winter which is typically the lowest session of the season ended with 172 participants. This is 35 participants above 2017's total of 132. We are currently taking registration for winter session 2.

- 4 members participated in our belay certification class that was held on Monday January 22. The belay certification is held the third Monday of every month from 8pm-10pm. Our hopes are to attract more adults to the climbing wall.
- Climbing Wall Safety Inspection is scheduled for February 15.
- Kids First Sports programs are going strong. Both basketball and soccer are running this first session with 22 participants.











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Park director, Marriott, police honored by Hoffman chamber

Retiring Hoffman Estates Park District Executive Director Dean Bostrom received a special recognition at the Hoffman Estates Chamber of Commerce & Industry's seventh annual Celebration of Excellence Dinner Thursday, an unscheduled award in addition to the event's five others.

This extra honor was made only six days after Bostrom was surprised with the Robert Artz Lifetime Achievement Award at the Illinois Park and Recreation's annual conference in Chicago.

"You have dramatically left this community way better than you found it," said Hoffman Estates Village Manager Jim Norris, serving as master of ceremonies for the chamber's dinner.

In similar fashion, it was Martha Keyes, who'd been assisting in handing out the awards to others, who won Volunteer of the Year herself. She has been conference services manager at the Northern Illinois University Conference Center in Hoffman Estates for the past 17 years.

Police Chief Ted Bos accepted the Public Sector Partner of the Year Award on behalf of the Hoffman Estates Police Department he leads.

Allen Gabe of Allen Gabe Law, who also serves as the chamber's attorney, was recognized as Small Business of the Year.

Brookdale Hoffman Estates, an independent-living and assisted-living community for seniors, was honored with the Chairman's Award.

Incoming Chairwoman Jennifer Walker of Tate & Lyle Americas praised the leadership of chamber Executive Director Tricia O'Brien, who last year brought the organization up to 335 members, started its taking a stand on issues affecting businesses, and personally earned an accreditation held by only 35 chamber leaders in Illinois.

He helped change state leg-He helped change state leg-islation to allow for a highway billboard to secure a partner-ship with the Chicago Wolves. The partnership secured funding for construction of a new ice facility. He part-nered with many other local municipalities as well to promunicipalities as well to pro-vide services to the commu-nity, and formed private part-nerships raising more than \$500,000 in sponsorships. Bostrom also co-founded the Friends of HE Parks

Foundation in 1999. Under his tenure, the park district won many presti-gious awards, including National Gold Medal from the National Recreation and Parks Association in 2009. Accreditation by the Commission for Accreditation for Parks and Recreation in 2014 and 2018, and also accred-ited by the IAPD/IPRA annually since 1999 and the Park District Risk Management Association from 2010 to the

Background:

During the first week of February 2018, PDRMA suggested to administrative staff that cash incentives earned from the PATH program should be included in each employee's taxable earnings, as they are likely to be viewed as such by the IRS.

Implications:

Each year, HEPD full-time staff members have the opportunity to earn a cash incentive of up to \$400 by participating in PDRMA's wellness program called Positive Activities Towards Health (PATH). Incentives are earned throughout a calendar year, and paid the following February. PDRMA pays the cash incentive directly to the employee. This month, full-time employees received the cash incentive they earned by completing PATH activities in 2017. The incentives were paid via a VISA gift card which is considered a cash payment.

Beginning in 2018, PDRMA is providing HEPD administrative staff with the amount of cash incentive each employee earned during the prior year's program, so that amount may be included in the employee's taxable earnings. In the past, administrative staff was unaware of the incentive earned, if any, by each employee.

It has been the practice of our District to include cash incentives and other payments including amounts paid for our insurance opt out incentive (if an employee declines insurance coverage when they have other coverage available) as IMRF wages. This is the similar required treatment we use for non-cash wages which are reportable earnings to IMRF.

IMRF now requires the District to pass a formal resolution to include these earnings as reportable IMRF wages. IMRF provides the template resolution for this purpose, which is attached as Resolution R18-001.

Recommendation:

That the board approves and executes the attached resolution R18-001 (IMRF Form 6.75).
